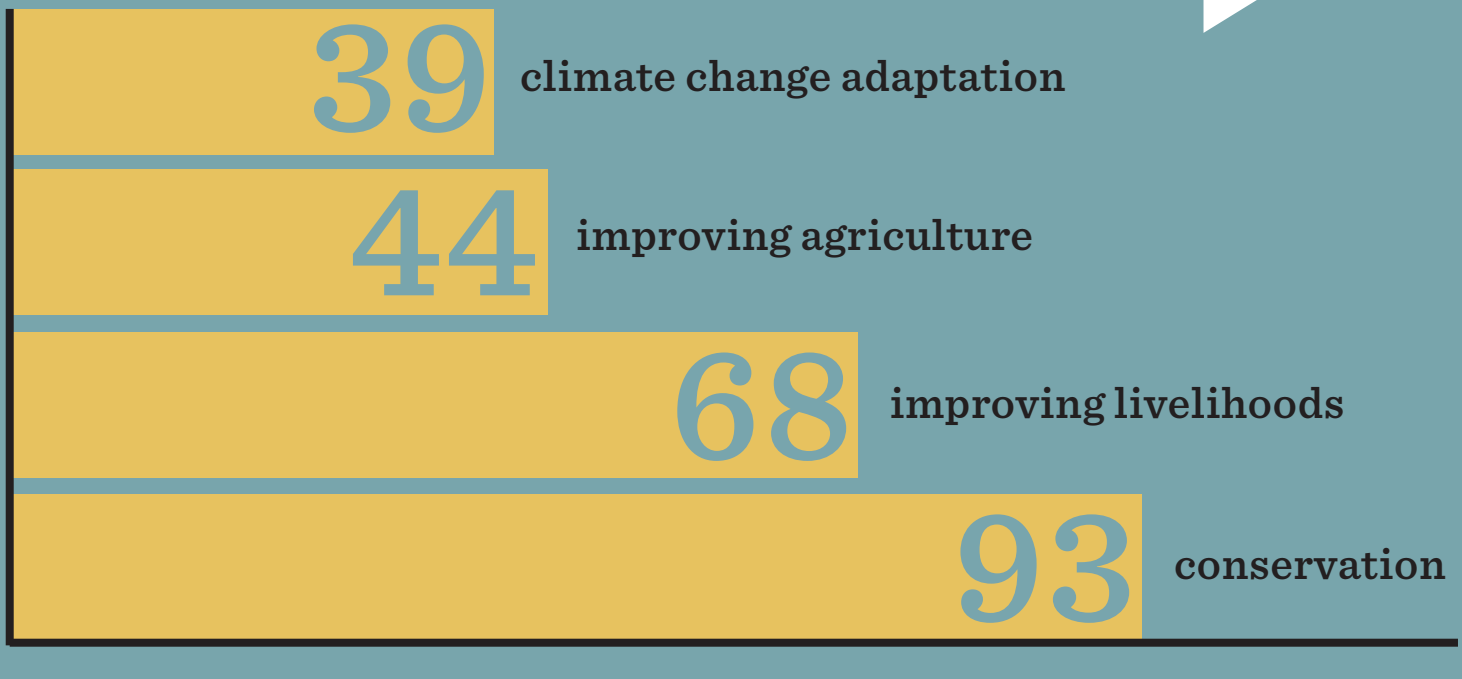

Number of ILIs surveyed: 104

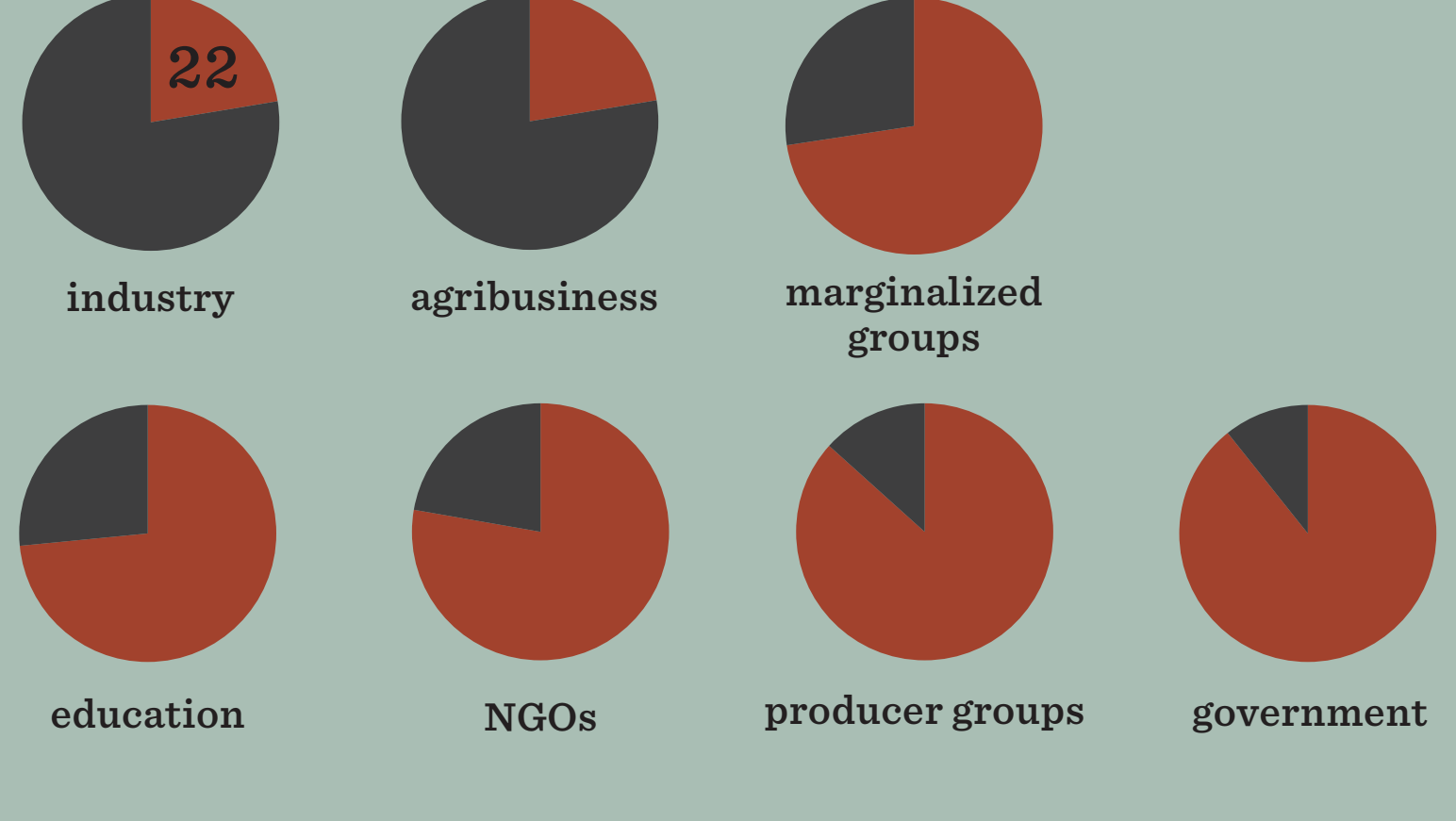
For this study, we define ILIs as projects, programs, platforms, initiatives or sets of activities that: (1) seek to simultaneously improve food production, biodiversity, ecosystems and rural livelihoods; (2) work at a landscape scale; (3) involve inter-sectoral coordination, policies or investments at a variety of levels; and (4) are highly participatory within a social learning framework.

Number of initiatives reporting each of 4 main categories of **primary motivations**:

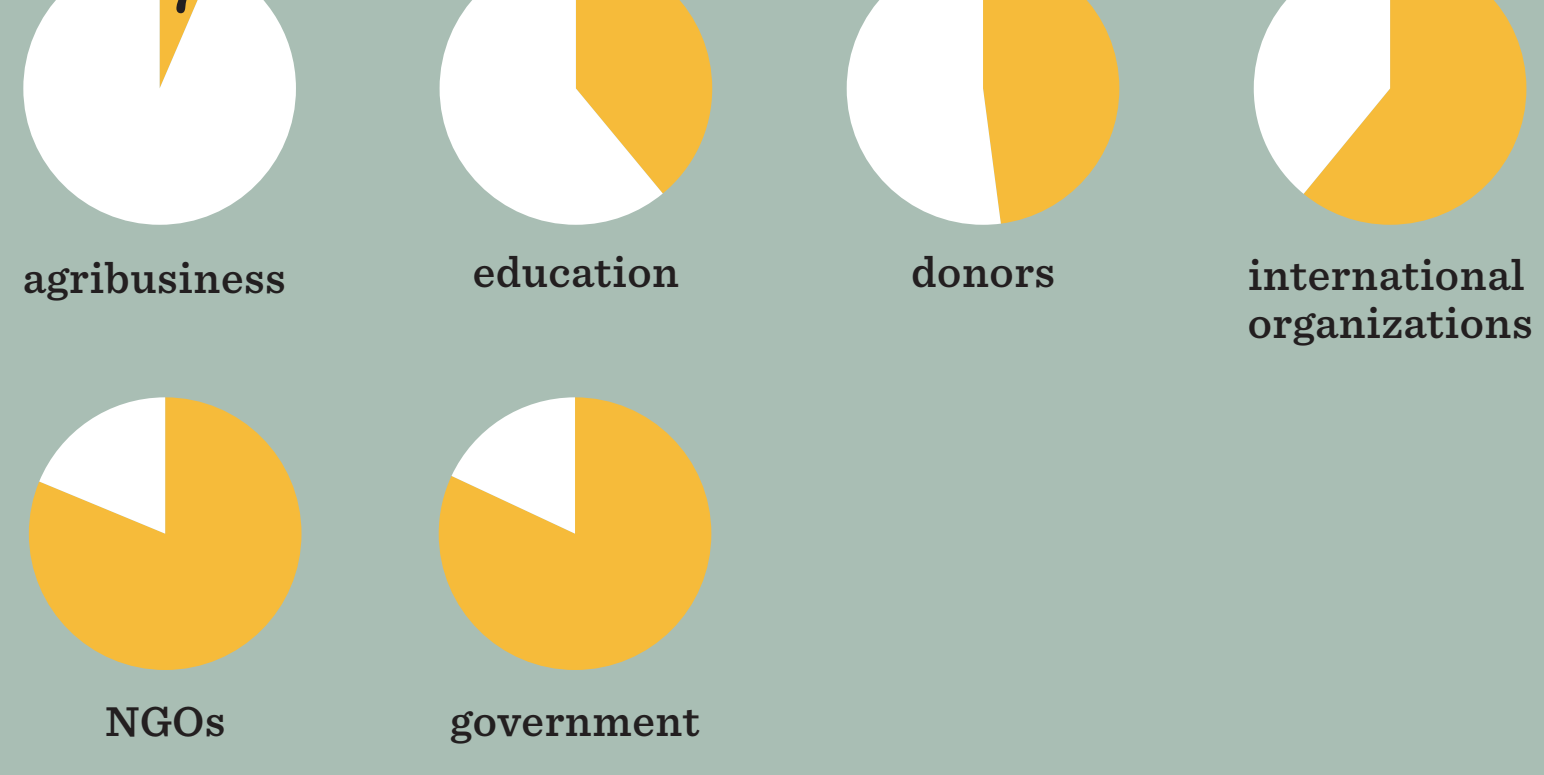


% of initiatives whose participants included at least one stakeholder group from each of the following categories

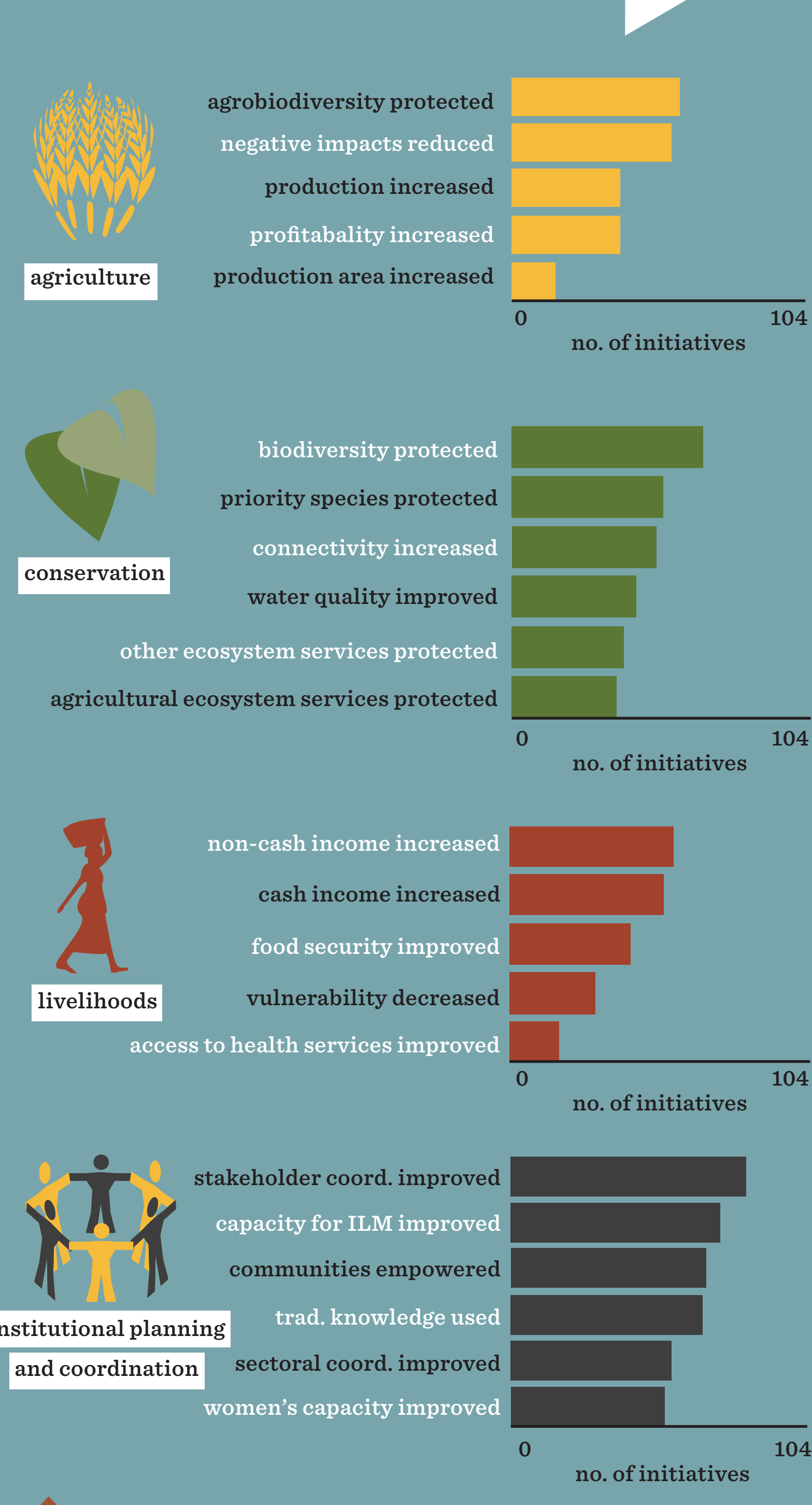
participants from within the ILI:



participants from outside of the ILI:



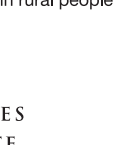
reported outcomes of investments in each of 4 categories
